WARBUCK'S COMMERCIAL HOTEL LTD. 3752 Netherby Rd. Snyder Built as a home for Henry Ort in 1836, it was LISTED AS BEING ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF Sodom Rd. in the Township pf Willoughby. Henry Ort got his first license to oferate the place as a hotel in 1851. After he left came Mr. Seese, followed by Joseph Bauer in 1871. In 1910 the hotel was sold to Andrew Willick who remained till Sept. 1948. He sold to Mr.Andy Zuba From Zuba the hotel went to Rodger and Anna Featherstone and John Mikitchuk, all from Hamilton. They took overFeb. 1974. TAVERNS & BOARDING HOUSE in Greater Fort Erie: no Longer

1812: Mother Palmer's: Military reserve by old fort, on Lakeshore.

- 1820's. Circa. Canada House: S.w.cr. of Catherine & Niagara River Rd. Prop. Patrick Radican. Sold to George Lewis: called Lewis House. 1900: converted to private dwelling by Dunham family. 1962 purchased by Mario Rossi for bake shop. 1971 completely remodelled. nothing remaining of original building: Ontario Bakery.
- 1860's. Frontier House: situated on the south side of the Lewis House. No doubt dating from the middle 1800's. In 1870 it was known as Magwoods, but nicknamed " Magwood's Sunday School". It was later called The Commercial House, owned and operated in the early 1900's by Harry Hawkins. Many years later a private home, and an apartment. Building caught fire Aug. 3rd. 1971. It was demolished three weeks later.
- 1850's Circa. The Ferry House: Very little is known of this Inn, except that it stood for a number of years on a plot of ground that jutted out into the river, in front of the Lewis House. It was also the landing place for the lower ferry, and the Customs House stood on the same site. This land has long been hidden by the waters of the Niagara River. It's propietor was Samuel Courthard.
- 1880's Circa. This was a very small two story and a half frame building that stood on the west side of the Niagara River road in the heart of the village of Fort Erie, just opposite the upper ferry landing. Just before the turn of the Century Fred Spain left his hotel on Courtwright St. and became propietor here. In 1900 Samuel Ramey moved to town and took over from Mr. Spain. In 1904 he had the <u>Cottage Hotel</u> moved back on the lot, and began the construction of the King Edward Hotel in front. It opened for business in 1905, and a year later. Sam sold to his brother Ed. The old cottage Hotel now serves for the kitchen of the King Edward, thus giving a true idea of it's original size.

THE PICKWICK ARMS.

MS. This large brick hotel was ..._

for the company of Ditchburn and Post. It OILCL three and five room sweets and batchelor apartments It stood on the S.W. cr. of King and the Garrison. It was operated by Mr. Cervais, and shortly after its opening renamed the Pickwick arms. It was a luxury hotel for that day. Along with the rooms. the guests were provided with a coffe shop, Writing room curiosity shop, and lounge.Each room was provide with a telephone, baths with hot and cold water, a telegraph service in the building, and a laundry room, and valet service were also provided. A large addition to the back was added in 1930. Mr. Cervais left for Montreal and William Robinson took over.By 1935 the place was called Mather Arms, and many years later known as the Fort Erie Hotel. In 1976 Sal Cirillo took over the ownership and it was given the name Port of Entry. It was burnt to the ground Nov. 27. 1977.

LYNHAVEN The Lynhaven was originaly built as a home. In NIAGARA Blvd. 1928 it was turned into a dinining room and Cr. Catherine. boarding house, by Mr. E.B. Havens. In 1927

> the business was taken over by the Wong family, the brother of Skippy and Kee Wong , who the townsfolk called Wong Kee. He brought his wife May into the business on their marriage in 1930. After the death of Wong Kee in 1953 she took over the operation of the Hotel. After the war, most of the upstairs rooms were turned into private dining areas and the place was then known as Niagara Tavern. In 1980 May retired to Hamilton and the property was sold to the owner of the Ontario Bakery, Mario Rossi for use as a parking lot. On July the second the building was completely demolished.

TAVERNS & BOARDING HOUSE NOT REMAINING:::

Fishermans Rest::: Built by George Nettle in 1830 this tavern Niagara Blvd. remained in operation till 1897, when it was demolished. It stood on the river road not far from Frenchman's Creek. It was a large stone place 200 ft. by twenty five, with a large veranda running across the front.

FERRY HOUSE Built in the 1860's this small tavern stood on the NIAGARA & Bowen. South East cr. of Bowen and the Niagara River rd. Bowen at thst time was called Ferry st, although the boats that left for Black Rock in the U.S.A. were mear rowboats. At this time the business was operated by Joseph Stevens. This is no doubt the same tavern run by Joe Lanigan, who had his licence : in 1875.

- Buck's Tavern. From the 1850's & 60's. This place stood on the south side of Bowen road, south of Ridgemount Hotel. It was destroyed by fire.
- RIDGEMOUNT Hotel: Built 1870's circa . A rather small place of brjck with a veranda running across the front and opening Bowen Rd. N.S. to the second floor. It stood on the North east side of Bowen and Ridgemount roads. Beside it was a large ice house. The building was taken down in 1925., as property bought by Ben Spear. Opt. B Willi ck 1915: Built by Jake Lee 1860's N.E. cr. of Nigh and Half Way House Windmill point rd. East. It was a large frame Bertie Township building with a verada that extended across the front. There was a general storeand a post office nearby. The upstairs contained the usual ballroom. Ater Jake left the business, his two sons Operated for a time. In May 1902 the buiness was sold by William Huffman to Edward Joseph Hawkins. He operate it for a time then moving to the Stevensville Hotel He sold to Charlie Hawkins and it burnt to the grou in 1914. A cement block homestead was built in it's place; however both are long gone.
- FREEBURY HOIEL Built before Fennian Raids, at Freebury's Landing foot of Bowen Read.

The building that housed the Riverview boarding nome Riverview was one of the earliest in Fort Erie facing the Mill W.side Erie St. Stream that flowed into Kerby's Red Mill. When David Paulus married to Lititia Sabine he was given this home by his father, in 1883. When he took permanently ill in 1925 Lititia turned the old home into the Riverview boarding house. It was a large two story frame house " built in 1819 . It had fourteen rooms, and had a fire place in all but three of the rooms. It had eight bedrooms in all, a library, living room, dining room, kitchen and bath room. Out back it had a carpentry shop, for Davids use. When the Peace Bridge was under construction, this old homestead was too old to be moved, and instead was demolished in 1926.

THE GLOBE ::: before the 1900's operated by Finlayson. renamed The New Waldorf : The International THE INTERNATIONAL This large two story frame building stood on Bridge Bridge St. St., just a roadway from the old C.N.R. railway Station. It was no doubt built in the middle 1870's when the International Bridge went up, and always looked it's age. Between 1915 and 1922 it was operated by a William Dunn. The property was bought by the owners of the Mentholetum Company and it was demolished in the late 20's. In 1913 before Dunn's called New Waldorf.

The John T. James Built around the time that the International boarding house. Built around the time that the International bridge went up. It stood on the north side of Courtwright facing the railroad tracks, some distance above Central Ave. It was burnt by fire, as was the usual fate of these establishments.

THE FLAT TOP HOTEL N.S. of Upper Jarvis Bridgeburg

Built in 1878 by Dunn

establishment stood on the north side just up from Crooks facing the railroad tracks St. The ground floor held a large kitchen, a dining room and two rooms for the owners. Upstairs was a large undevided room, where the railroad men would sleep in between runs. There were no beds, and the mattresses were placed directly on the floor. Ed moved to the south end and his son Edward Joseph took over. It then went to an old railroad employee, a Mr. Lamb. His wife Pattie ran the place. In the 1920's it was damaged by fire, however was rebuilt. Left empty for a number of years after Mr. Lamp moved, it was finally taken down in the 1930's. Built in 1877 this large three story frame building with front verada, stood on the south side of the railroad tracks, just across the road from the station. It owner and manager in the early 1900's was A. White. It was a centr for commercial travellors, who often rented a room there and displayed their wares in the sample room on the south side. It was greatly remodelled by Mr. White in 1927. The name continued down through the years, till it was demolished in 1965. In the early 1970's Brewers Warehouse was built on the site

When first in operation it shared bu. ing when if st in operations with a grocery store. In 1979 Ted Kassay purchased the ol Hotel and converted it into the Bapecialt Village, housing a number of smal w buain, shops. Hotel was closed, and th buain, failed.

Queen's Hotel Ridge Rd. W.S. Ridgeway. 1870' THOMAS CREESE

The Ontario Hotel Erie St. Crystal Beach.

THE ERIE BEACH HOTEL: Built in 1905, this large rambling building Erie Beach. boasted a tower at one end and an open veranda where the guests could sit to w atch the boats comming and going from the Erie Beach Dock. It operated after the Beach closed, however in Sept. 1935 it was destroyed by fire, and never rebuilt.

ROYAL HOTEL Crystal Beach Park Originaly built as the Assembly House to house visitors to the evangelist meetings then held at Crystal Beach. This venture lasted only one year. One of the noted speakers was Sam Jones. The builder was Dr. Thomas Snyder, who was also an evangelist preacher. It was a large L shaped frame building and faced Derby road. It met new life as the Royal Hotel, however it met the fate of many of the others when it was destroyed by fire 1923.

> The Lakeside INN: west side of Lakeshore Rd., 3 mile from Ferry Landing Built for tourists visiting ErieBeach which was only a ten miles walk away. Accomodation for sixty, meals served, but no liquor when opened.

HOTEL ::: still standing as residence.

WILLSON'S INN. RIDGE RD. CR. NIGH. This large two story frame building was built circa 1850's as an Inn. It stood on the crossroads and the Nigh was a most travelled road at the time. The building was used as a half way house and the post office was here frowmany of it's earliest years. It became the home of the Willosn family, and eventually was used for many purposes and most recently as a Antique Store.

SHIELDS HOTEL West Main St. Stevensville

prop. 1876 John F. Gray

The National Hotel East Main St. Stevensville

This place of business stood on the north side of West Main St. just up from the corner lot. It got it's licence in 1878 as the Stevensville Hotel owned and operated by Robert Hutcheon. The following year when he applied for his licence he called it Shields. In 1884 he had a large two story brick place built on the corner and opened it as the Hutcheon House.

This hotel a rather small frame building stood on the north side of East Main , four buildings down from the Cr. of Stevensville road. It was run by John Romance, who was living there sometime before 1883. He leased the hotel to John Mc. Intosh of Fort Erie in 1898. He could not have had it too long for in 1901 the papers recorded that William Mc. Cleary had converted the old National, served meals and had a license to sell drinks. Perhaps Romance had the place only as boarding house and dining room. Mr. J. Romance left this location for a Spot on the south side of Town Line now Willicks Store. TAVERN & BOARDING HOUSE : still standing ...

Winte mute's early 1800's Niagara Blvd.

Fort Erhe. Grant of land to Abraham Wintemute 1799. House but shortly after. Mary Wintemute kept a tavern here a number of years. Travellers crossing the ferry a Black Rock stopped at Wintemute's tavern before heading to the Falls. The home passed down to He Warren Lewis and her husband in 1912, and out of family in the late 60's. It has been for many year a private residence.

THE NEW SHERMAN NIAGARA BLVD. CR. OF DUFFERIN. This large two story frame boarding house story on the N.E. cr. of the river road and Duffering For many years the Ferry landing operated just in front of this establishment. Built shortly after the founding of Victoria(the north end in 1873, it was owned and operated by Nellie Sherman . In 1901, Mr. Michael was the operation and in 1890 Mr. Norse. For many years it has been used as an apartment building.

BERTIE-HOTEL: John Crabb an Englishman purchased the old Forsyt) Niagara Blvd.home on the north east cr. ofPhipps and the Niaga River road in 1874. He defaulted in 1892 and the property went to G. Barrett as a home.

HOTELS IN GREATER FORT ERIE ::: built after 1900.

The Royal Hotel: Jarvis & Niagara Blvd. This large two story brick building was built in 1906 for Samuel Johnston. It had a large veranda running acrss the front, which afforded a good view of the Niagara River in front. In 1909 it was purchased by Mrs. Fritz of Black Rock. After her death in 1929 it was taken over by her daughter Verna Uster. She operated the Hotel till 1946 when it was sold to Peter Stanek & John Dymon. In 1956 it went to Mollie and Clarence Hyslop and has had many other bwners. It changed little through the years except for the closing in of the open veranda for added dining space. It was remodelled again in 1982 and a complete overhaul in 1983 with the help of a nead program . Barn boards now cover the lower half of the hotel with white siding of aluminum on the upper floor. All ground widows have been eliminated, for the hotel is now providing strip shows nightly.

Once more the hotel has been renamed::: 1983::: called The Stage Door.

THE KING EDWARD. NIAGARA BLVD.South end.

This large two story brick hotel was built in 1904 for Samuel Ramey. It went into oper: in 1905. It had a large veranda across the front that could be reached from the upper floor. One could get a good view of the Niagsra river and the ferry boats ocmming and leaving the ferry landing which was ju in front. Mr. Sam Ramey left the business selling the hotel to his brother Ed. Whe opened it was one of the finest from here the Falls. The open veranda was removed many years ago, and although there has t several changes inside, it is nothing o it's former glory. It was purchased by the Mayor of Portcolborne, and became F Eri's first bar to present nude girlie

WAVERLY HOTEL::: Built as a home around the turn of the Centur, HELENA ST. it was not used as a boarding house till after WAVERLY BEACH. the closing of Erie Beach and the burning of the cld Erie Beach Hotel in 1935. It was purchased by Mr. & Mrs. A. Banatti in the late 1950's at at that time they got a licence to serve drinks. THE GARRISON INN.

CENTRAL AVE.

In Aug. 1973 the Garrison Motor Inns ltd. began the construction of a \$5 million hotel complex overlooking the river and lake by the entrance to the Peace Bridge. It is to be built in three stages. When the first is completed it will consist of 74 guest rooms, a dining room seating 160, a entertainment room holding 200, a banquet room to seat 150, and other areas such as a heated swimming pool To make way for the site, ment the removal of the old Riverview apartments on Goderich St. and along with them several houses that remained on the west side of Goderich. Also demolished was the Yuhas Motel that stood on the S.E. cr. of the Garrison and Central Ave. It was called the Peace Bridge Motel. The Garrison opened in Sept. 1974 officially Oct. 31st. 1974. An expansion got underway in Feb. 1976, and a new manager was appointed. In Dec. 1976 the Motor Inn announced that it would be closing because it was heavily in debt. In due time new owners were found and the Motel was again in operation, in 1978.

HOTELS built after 1900 in Ridgeway and Crystal Beach.

Ridge Tavern. Built by Dominic Mazzarini 1929. s.w. cr. of built home 1926: moved back for Ridge Hotel. noted for dinining room . Renamed Ridge House. Ridge & Garrison Rd. finally Ridge Tavern. Sold by Dominic 1946. Ridgeway.

Original building was half present size. Manager and owner Omer He bert. #10 Ridgeway Rd. Closed in bankruptcy. Reopened.

The Terrace Inn This Inn built on the Lakeside was originaly a private club. In the 1920's it became 3823 Terrace Lane. Sheehan's Hotel The prop. Mrs. M. Sheehan. Crystal Beach. It was a large two story frame building with a dining room on the ground floor, a basement bar, and twelve guest rooms on second floor. A bar was later added on the ground floor. In 1947 the manager was Mr. Sokach, and the place was renamed the Palwood. Other owners: Thompson: T. Papalia: T. Barson:

Built in 1901 by Ed Buck as a rooming house. It later included a general store and Post office. It was the first to receive a license to sell spirits after the prohibition. It was run by several members of the family, and was very popular with the villagers and visitors. It was one of the few to stay open during the winter months. At first only light beer was sold here: 4/4. Mr. Buck became Mayor Justice of the Peace, and treasurer of Crystal Beach. It gradually ran into disrepair and rather then sink money into it, Ed closed it in 1956. It was demolished in 1982.

In the 1930's the Ontario shared the building with Kimmerles Grocery Store. For many years it was managed by Bill Homes. In 1979 Ted Kassay purchased the Hotel with high hopes of turning it into a Bavarian Viilage. The Ontario closed and Mr. Kassy remodelled the place to house a number of small specialty shops. Afte only in operation for a year or so, the place went into bankruptcy. It has been empty and boarded up ever since.

The BON AIR HOTEL The Boan Air stood on the hill facing the Crystal Beach Park. Destroyed by fire.

The OGIS HOTEL: N.E. cr. of Derby & Rebstock Rds. Crystal Beach. The VICTORY INN Original Owners, Burnstein from Buffalo.Private Club. TERRACE LN. Purchased by Joe Yesman 1942 who operated CRYSTAL BEACH. the place of business till 1948. It was sold to three business men. from Toronto. The name was changed to the Edgewater. Hotel again sold to Walter Coleman.Cont. 30 rooms. Destroyed by fire 1950.

London's Hotel & This Hotel stood on Erie St. facing the Park, Dining Room. just west of the Teal Hotel. It was destroyed Erie Rd. by fire. Also called the Crystal. Crystal Beach

PRINCESS HOTEL Owned by Doug Smith & Mr. Huggar. N.E. Cr. of Derby Out of business 30's.
