

Ferry Service Ended in 1950

On Labor Day, 1950 the shrill whistle of the Orleans and the deeper tones of the City of Toledo whistle echoed across the Niagara River for the last time writing "Finis" to more than a century and a half of ferry shunting between Fort Erie and Buffalo.

Up to nine boats plied the Niagara at one time from this operation that started in 1796. Car ferries carrying up to 80 cars, (The Toledo) shunted and chugged across the river carrying both people and goods.

Many residents preferred the boat trip to the Peace Bridge for a quiet evening. The five minute bridge trip after the late 20's when the bridge was constructed soon cancelled out the 17 minute jaunt by ferry.
