WILLIAM STANTON::: 1756 - 1833

William Stanton was the first of this family to come to Ganada and thence to Fort Erie. For his service in the army of George the third, he received the rank of General, and was Commissary General of the British Army.

He married Margaret Robertson, who was the first white woman in the district after the Indians left. The General's wife gave birth to 21 children, seven sets of twins and seven other children.

He spent his early life in the village, however in 1822 he was transfered to Amherstburg, to take charge of the west as Commissariant. The General moved there with his wife and a number of his children. He lived to the ripe old age of 77 and is burried in St. Paul's Churchyard.

STANTOM:

It is not known where William Stanton lived when he came to the village of Waterloo, however his son James Robertson Stanton and Martha Ann, after their marriage in 1836 lived on the lot at the N.E. corner of the Niagara Blvd. The property had belonged to Benjamin Hardison, and he willed it to the wife of James, Martha Ann Stanton

They sold in 1843 and moved to a lot on the west side of Battery street where they built the large brick house that has stood for so many years.
