

Col. Muir dies in Toronto

Lieut.-Col. Charles A. Muir, who commanded the Lincoln and Welland Regiment when it went overseas in the Second World War, was buried today in Toronto. He died last Thursday at Sunnybrook Medical Centre.

Col. Muir, who formerly was in command of the regiment's C Company in Fort Erie, was appointed regimental commander June 22, 1940, and was in command when the regiment went to Scotland in 1943.

During the First World War he enlisted with the 91st Highlanders from his Fort Erie home. He went overseas with the 36th Battalion. In France he was transferred to the 4th Battalion and was wounded in action at the Battle of the Somme in 1916. He was invalided home and honorably discharged.

Col. Muir joined the Lincoln and Welland regiment when the Canadian Militia was reorganized in 1921.

He is survived by his wife Helen, a son and a daughter, all of Toronto.
