Before The outside door was opened I heard a voice inside, calling out in a not very wellcome voice, - "Well: what is it," what is it." I stept inside the hall when the lady again said, What is it. I said I was calling on Ed. Hankins or mr. Hawkins. The young good looking lady said. Well! I am Mrs Hawkins, I said No: not the mis Hawkins I am looking for. I said I wanted to see hed Hawkins

told by Bella Laux : Mr. Ed. hawkins came to Canada from England in 1870. He landed at Miagara Falls , and proceeded to Brantford where he had a brother living. On July 3rd, 1871 he married Issabelle Warden. They moved to what was then called Victoria; and Ed. had a two story frame hotel built at the top of Jarvis St. by the Round House. They brought with them their three oldest children who were born in Brantford Ted. , Harry and Bertie. The Hotel was used mostly as an overnight stop for railroad men, and the cost of a room and breakfast was 15¢. As well as several rooms upstairs, the place had a large kitchen and a bar on the ground floor. Ed. kept a cow pigs and ducks to feed his growing family. In 1888 Ed and his family moved to the Village of Fort Erie where he had set up his brother Fred Hawkins in the Bakery business; located in the building now occupied by Merv. Camm. Fred left for Buffalo and Ed. took over the Bakery business.

He had a large home, that stood on the south corner of Princess and the Niagara BlvB. moved back to the corner of Waterloo. The house ther faced on to Prices St., and Ed had a large verandah built across it and running along the east side. The home had 14 rooms. There were four bedrooms upstairs, on the ground floor two parlors, a dining room, sitting room, den, kitchen two pantries and he had added also a bathroom. When Ted married he took over the Hotel from Ed. then later moved to the Half-way House in Bertie Township. When this met with fire Ted took over the Hotel

in Stevensville. In the early 1920's the old Victoria Hotel was rented from Ed., and ran by r. Lamb, and his wife Patty, then on the death of Mr. Lamb, his widow took over. The Old Victoria Or Flat top as it was nick named stood vacant for some time and was final ly taken down in the thirties.

Charlie Hawkins ran the Half Way House for about two years, when it caught on fire, and he moved the the U.S.A.
