John De Cue(De Cew) his forefathers were French Huguenots, who fled from France to England, on account of their Religion; and at an early date came to America and settled in Vermont; where John was born in 1766. He married Catherine Docksteder, May 10th., 1804; and is recorded in Reed's " The Loyalists in Ontario". They are bu ied in Decewsville, with other members of their family.

" Upon locating at the Falls (now De Cue) John De Cue erected a log cabin facing his mill, and the stream that furnished it's power. John lived to the satisfactory age of 89 years, and his wife Catherine lived after him. In the Decewsville Cemetery which he donated to public use; they with several of their children and grandchildren are buried."
